Individual narratives about grief and loss are detailed, nuanced, complex and ongoing. Each grieving person has a unique story to tell, with a past, present, and future. The thought of telling these stories in their entirety, for many, can seem impossibly overwhelming.

This is why the challenge of choosing the perfect six words to tell your grief story can be so freeing. The six-word story is unassuming, uncomplicated, manageable, and yet surprisingly powerful.

Like the six-word story, this website is simple. Here's what you can do:

- 1. Share your own six-word story about grief
- 2. Read six-word stories submitted by other visitors
- 3. Show appreciation for six-word stories by clicking on the heart below the entries that most resonate with you.

The six-word story asks both writer and reader to forget context and to rely on our common threads to communicate, comprehend, and connect. If nothing else, we hope that the stories you read on this site will help you to see that you are not the only one and you are not alone.





How to set-up a "Backyard" Family Movie Night:

The Screen

The Movie

• So you have the screen, but now you need a movie. Pick a family favorite, a Disney classic, or whatever you can find on Netflix! If you want to get your kids involved, head to one of our local libraries and let them each pick out a movie for future movie nights.

The Seating

• The seating options are endless. Bring out pillows, bean bags, blankets, air mattresses, and anything comfortable for movie watching! Some families have even filled blow-up pools with blankets and pillows to create an extra comfy atmosphere.

The Food

• Theater food is simple and delicious, so don't overcomplicate this aspect of your family night. Pop some popcorn, pick up everyone's favorite candy, and maybe even treat your kids to a soda! Alternatively, pick up your family's favorite snacks and drinks, and enjoy!

The Details

• There are few other not-so-obvious things that will help make your backyard movie night a success. Bug spray is one of them. SIMBA'S GNOCCHI

Yield: 4 SERVINGS Prep time: 30 MINUTES Cook: 20 MINUTES Total time: 50 MINUTES

INGREDIENTS


- 11/2 cup all purpose flour
- 1 lb potatoes, peeled, boiled and mashed
- 1/4 cup parmesan cheese, grated
- 2 tablespoons parsley, chopped
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 cup broccoli, blanched
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1/2 cup cocktail shrimp, precooked



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Start a pot of boiling water.
- 2. In a large bowl, add mashed potatoes, flour, Parmesan cheese, chopped parsley, paprika, nutmeg, salt, pepper and the egg. Knead the mixture until it becomes dough and then form into a ball.
- 3. On a cutting board, roll the dough out into a snake roll about the thickness of your finger.
- 4. Use a fork to cut the roll into 1/2 inch pieces. Now let's make some 'grubs' out of our gnocchi!
- 5. Take the gnocchi and roll them down the tines of a fork. Looks like a grub, doesn't it?
- 6. Drop the gnocchi into your boiling water. When they float to the top they are done. Place gnocchi grubs on a tray and set aside.
- 7. In a sauté pan over medium high heat add olive oil and sauté your blanched broccoli and cherry tomatoes for 3-5 minutes.
- 8. Next, add your cocktail shrimp to the broccoli and tomatoes and cook for another 2-3 minutes.
- 9. Add your grubs to the pan and cook for 2-3 more minutes. Plate and enjoy!

TIMON & PUMBAA'S ICE CREAM PARFAITS

Yield: 8 SERVINGS Prep time: 30 MINUTES Cook: 20 MINUTES Total time: 50 MINUTES

INGREDIENTS


- Dark chocolate cookies
- Graham crackers
- Small glass jars
- Vanilla ice cream
- Chocolate ice cream
- Gummy worms
- Twine
- Scissors
- Small disposable spoons



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Place the cookies in a zip-top bag, then ground them up with a heavy kitchen utensil. Repeat with graham crackers.
- 2. Scoop a layer of vanilla ice cream into the bottom of the jar and flatten with a spoon.
- 3. Pour the ground graham crackers over the vanilla ice cream, making a slightly wider layer.
- 4. Add chocolate ice cream.
- 5. Cap off the top with the dark chocolate cookie grounds.
- 6. Add those "slimy yet satisfying" gummy worms on top.
- 7. Wrap a piece of twine around the top of the jar and tie a knot.
- 8. Place the spoon on the knot, then tie it on with a bow! Repeat with all jars.
